

Message from the Executive Director

2018 was a momentous and busy year for ACMT. Momentous because we celebrated ACMT's 25th Anniversary. Founded in 1993, ACMT has come a long way in the past 25 years. Our 2018 Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM) was our **biggest to date**, attracting 350 members and nonmembers from around the country and internationally. We presented over 170 research presentations, had some of our best keynote speakers, and celebrated ACMT's anniversary with a wonderful reception for founding members and past and present ACMT leaders. The venue – Washington DC – a big exciting city, was a departure from prior ASM that had more of a resort focus. We will continue this new metropolitan city flavor with the upcoming ASM 2019 in San Francisco, and beyond.

Of course, ASM was not the only educational activity on our busy plate. We organized another very successful **Board Review Course** in Chicago, and repeated our **Opioid Legal Course** in Dallas. In September, we also hosted our inaugural **ACMT Total Tox Course** that targets Emergency Providers and others interested in a comprehensive course in medical toxicology, a course we plan to repeat in December 2019 in Washington DC. We have continued to offer 3 webinars each month including National Case Conference, National Journal Club, ACMT Grand Rounds and our new monthly Addiction Medicine webinar series.

2018 marks the 9th year of Toxicology Investigators Consortium (ToxIC), ACMT's multi-center research endeavor and registry. This cooperative effort of ACMT members all over the country has now published over 30 papers and 100 abstracts. We have some ongoing funding through a series of research grants and corporate and governmental support, and engage more members on a regular basis than any other ACMT endeavor. ToxIC welcomes additional participants – please contact toxic@acmt.net for further information.

Beyond our ToxIC grants ACMT is now in our 5th year of managing the PEHSU program reflecting 20 years of continuous funding to ACMT from ATSDR, and in 2018 ACMT was awarded its third multi-year contract with the Department of Homeland Security to provide technical consultation.

ACMT has started to develop its own response to the **Opioid Epidemic** and how ACMT and medical toxicologists can make a difference. Our sister organization the MTF just received its first grant – for \$50,000 from the Independence Blue Cross Foundation – to provide buprenorphine education, and the Board of Directors just approved a new position statement on the use of buprenorphine in the Emergency Department.

Many many thanks to all the member volunteers who have led these initiatives and have shared their content expertise, leadership, experience, and passion with all of our members. And kudos to the great ACMT staff – now 11 full time and 2 part-time – all who go to work each day for ACMT.

2018 also marks 10 years of service to ACMT from our Executive Assistant **Tricia Steffey**. So much of what we have accomplished over these last 10 years is due to Tricia's dedication, perseverance, and always pleasant demeanor. Finally, 2018 marks 10 years of my service as Executive Director (after a prior 10 years of service on the Board of Directors). I look forward to ACMT's future and continuing to have the opportunity and privilege to help assist in driving ACMT's societal impact and success.

The 2018 ACMT Annual Scientific Meeting

was a great success! It was ACMT's highest attended event to date, with 331 attendees (next largest was 2016 ASM in Huntington Beach with 239 registrants). Highlights included featured presentations by Marilyn Huestis, PhD, Luanne Thorndyke, MD, and Arthur Kellermann, MD.

A big thank you to lead organizers Aryn O'Connor, MD, FACMT, and Andrew Stolbach, MD, MPH, FACMT, for developing and coordinating such a high quality conference!

Original Research

In the theme of "record breaking" 2018 ASM also broke records in the area of original research and the number of abstracts submitted. With 225 submitted abstracts, 2018 ASM saw a 50% increase from 2017 (145 submitted abstracts). The next largest was 2016 ASM in Huntington Beach with 160 submitted abstracts.



In the event survey, when asked why they chose to attend 2018 ASM, 58% responded it was because of the conference content, and 39% said it was because their abstract was accepted.

The growth of this vital and valuable aspect of ASM is due in large part to the guidance and leadership of **William "Russ" Kerns, II, MD, FACMT**, (pictured left) who has led these efforts as the Chair of the ACMT Research Committee and who is stepping down from this position in 2018. Thank you, Russ, for your many years of service to this committee!

SATELLITE SESSION

The 2018 ACMT Satellite "Toxic Threats, Chemical Security & Counterfeit Medications" also broke records with 122 attendees. The day kicked off with a discussion of counterfeit pharmaceuticals led by Brian Donnelly PhD, RPh (Director of the Americas Region, Global Security, Pfizer) who presented a counterfeit opioid case, highlighting the multiple steps in bringing raw ingredients from outside the U.S. onto the streets masquerading as a legitimate, diverted pharmaceutical.



The second part of the symposium focused on Chemical Security and included an expert group of researchers, disaster response personnel, and educators who provided insight into chemical terrorism and HazMat response. Topics included perspectives on modeling of airborne releases, planning for large-scale chemical response, access to reliable information, and new and developing medical countermeasures and antidotes.

ACMT Past-President Lewis Nelson, MD, FACMT, was awarded the Matthew J. Ellenhorn Award at the 2018 ASM in Washington, DC. This career achievement award honors an individual who has made extraordinary contributions to the field of medical toxicology.

Dr. Nelson is Professor, Emergency Medicine Chair, Department of Emergency Medicine Director, Division of Medical Toxicology at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School. He has held editorial and reviewer positions at the most prominent medical publications including:

- Senior Editor of Goldfrank's Toxicologic Emergencies textbook, the premier general clinical toxicology text in the world
- Associate Editor of the *Annals of Emergency Medicine*
- Peer Reviewer *Journal of the American Medical Association*
- Peer Reviewer of *The New England Journal of Medicine*

His CV lists 244 peer reviewed publications, 5 textbooks, countless international lectures and professional activities including sitting on the Editorial Board of *The Journal of Medical Toxicology* and Chair of the ACMT Education Committee, Fellowship Directors Committee, and Publication Committee.

With this in mind, in 2018 ACMT developed the Total Tox Course, a comprehensive review of the scope of medical toxicology taught by ACMT Members to other health care providers like Emergency Medicine Physicians, Pharmacists, Nurse Practitioners, and Operational/Tactical Specialized Practice Medics, among others.

ACMT is pleased to announce that we had a fantastic turnout for an inaugural event with 92 attendees. While the majority of attendees were local to Chicago, the course had broad appeal and an international audience, attracting attendees from as far as Finland, Japan, and Tasmania.

Because 36% of the attendees were pharmacists, ACMT will offer Continuing Pharmacy Education (CPE) credits at the second course coming up on December 9-11, 2019 in Washington, DC.

The 'pearls' are sample emergency cases with expert analysis and treatment answers written by volunteer ACMT members for readers of the ALiEM Blog. 2018 is our second year collaborating with ALiEM on this project, and this year's four pearls had a collective 4,720 online views.

In 2018, ACMT continued to manage Regions 6-10 of the national PEHSU's. 2018-2019 is the final year of a 5-year cooperative agreement supporting PEHSU from the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (ATSDR) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

In 2018, PEHSU produced seven webinars on topics including endocrine disrupting chemicals and obesity, radon, volcanic emergencies, extreme heat, late life neurodegenerative disorder exposures, home visit models and asthma, and lead and school readiness. These webinars are created for ACMT members, pediatricians, nurses, other health care professionals, etc. All webinars are available on-demand in the PEHSU National Classroom.

PEHSU continues to distribute a monthly E-newsletter, which features regional highlights and national news relevant to the program. A resource page for Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) was recently created with a fact sheet, webinar, and other resources that would be helpful to healthcare providers and the community.

The PEHSU program also exhibited at several important medical and public health association meetings this year including the Pediatric Academic Society and American Public Health Association.

On July 23-25, 2018, ACMT co-hosted the PEHSU annual meeting at Emory University in Atlanta, GA. Scientific sessions included PFAS, reproductive environmental health, and natural disasters. These sessions were recorded and are available on the PEHSU National Classroom.

ADVANCING MED TOX RESEARCH

ACMT's ToxIC Registry is a unique database of patient cases who present in the acute care or clinical setting where a medical toxicologist is consulted. The registry, which is accessible to all ACMT members, provides a reliable clinical data on patients. The database continues to grow with 35 active sites and more than 65,000 cases nationwide on topics including the North American Snakebite Registry, Synthetic Cannabinoid use data, and poisoning by plants.

Approximately 8,000 cases are added each year, under the leadership team of **Jeffrey Brent** MD, PhD, FACMT, (Principal Investigator), **Paul Wax**, MD, (Co-Principal Investigator), **Diane Calello**, MD, FACMT, (Director of Site Coordination and Research), **Sharan Campleman** PhD, MPH, DABT, (Program Manager) and **Shao Li**, MPH, (Toxicology Data Quality Associate).

ACMT Quality Measures Approved by The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services



The first-ever medical toxicology measures approved by CMS are instrumental to help improve patient care and safety.

In January 2018, The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) announced that they have approved six quality measures developed by ACMT. These are the first-ever medical toxicology quality measures approved by CMS, and are now among hundreds of measures that physicians can report to CMS as part of their Merit-Based Incentive Payment System (MIPS) program.

CMS also certified ACMT's Toxicology Investigators Consortium (ToxIC) Registry as a Qualified Clinical Data Registry (QCDR). ToxIC, founded in 2010, is a unique multicenter toxico-surveillance and research network comprised of physicians specifically qualified in the field of medical toxicology. Using the ToxIC QCDR, medical toxicologists can now choose from reporting measures when participating in this important quality improvement program.

"The QCDR designation is instrumental to help medical toxicologists and other providers improve patient care," said ACMT Executive Director, **Paul Wax**, MD.



The six CMS-approved measures include:

- Screening for risk of opioid misuse
- Pregnancy test in women who receive toxicologic consult
- EKG assessment in acute overdose
- Treatment for acetaminophen ingestions
- Assessment of suspected ethylene glycol or methanol exposures
- Repeat assessment of salicylate concentrations in overdose patients

With these measures, physician medical toxicologists can accurately report on the treatment of common poisonings such as acetaminophen and salicylate poisonings as well as screening for evidence of opioid abuse.


"In a rapidly evolving healthcare system that is moving quickly toward quality-based payment, this is an important step for ACMT to guide our members and medical toxicologists across the country," adds ACMT President, Charles McKay, MD.

ADVANCING MED TOX RESEARCH

ToxIC and NDEWS Collaborate to Identify Emerging Drugs and Trends Nationwide

In October 2018, ToxIC partnered with the National Drug Early Warning System (NDEWS) to develop a capability to identify emerging drugs and drug trends encountered by medical toxicologists during patient consultations and toxicology evaluations. Using data from ToxIC we are highlighting cases involving novel and emerging exposures in approximately 35 sites across the U.S. This is an exciting new use of the registry and reflects its capacity as a powerful national research tool.

ADVOCATING FOR MEDICAL TOXICOLOGY

Positions & Guidelines

In January, ACMT published 'Addressing the Rising Cost of Prescription Antidotes.'

In response to unprecedented increases in the costs of antidotes, this ACMT Position Statement calls upon providers, hospitals, formularies, pharmaceutical industry, government, insurance companies and pharmacy benefit managers to adopt practices to ensure that antidotes are available to our patients, and priced based on value and cost.

In December, ACMT published 'Buprenorphine Administration in the Emergency Department.'

ACMT supports the administration of buprenorphine in the emergency department (ED) as a bridge to long-term addiction treatment. Furthermore, ACMT supports the administration of buprenorphine to patients in the ED to treat opioid withdrawal and to reduce the risk of opioid overdose and death following discharge.

The 2017 ACMT and AACT Position Statement **'Preventing Occupational Fentanyl and Fentanyl Analog Exposure to Emergency Responders'** which outlines the low risk of passive fentanyl exposure for emergency workers, continued to make headlines throughout 2018. The ACMT Communications Task Force still receives frequent requests for expert knowledge by Medical Toxicologists on this topic.

ACMT Collaborates on 'Fentanyl: The Real Deal, a Training Video for First Responders'

ACMT collaborates on Fentanyl video



In August, the Department of Justice, in partnership with nine additional Federal departments/agencies and 24 stakeholder associations/organizations, including ACMT, released *Fentanyl: The Real Deal*. The video, designed for roll call training, reinforces key messages from the Fentanyl Safety Recommendations for First Responders, which ACMT also collaborated on, released in November 2017.

America's first responders – including law enforcement officers, firefighters, and emergency medical services (EMS) providers – are increasingly likely to encounter fentanyl and other synthetic opioids during the course of their daily activities, such as responding to overdose calls and conducting traffic stops, arrests, and searches.

ACMT maintains that the risk of accidental opioid ingestion is *"extremely low."* *Gloves almost always provide enough protection; masks are necessary only in exceptional cases."*

As the official journal of ACMT, the *Journal of Medical Toxicology* (JMT) is managed by an editorial board of 23 prominent toxicologists and an advisory board of internationally recognized experts who are dedicated to publishing research that is relevant to medical toxicologists, emergency physicians, critical care specialists, pediatricians, pre-hospital providers, occupational physicians, substance abuse experts, veterinary toxicologists, and policy makers.

JMT articles generated considerable interest among research experts and media outlets worldwide. A JMT editorial on the toxic effects of microplastics was among the **Top 10 most downloaded articles** among all SpringerNature journals in the category of Pharmacology and Toxicology in 2018.

In 2018, a new SharedIt initiative with SpringerNature was launched, which allows authors to post their full-text research articles on social media platforms and in institutional repositories to share with colleagues and general audiences.






